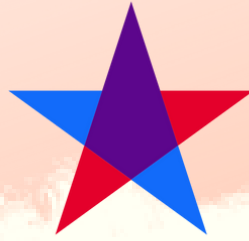




Resources to Protect Your Family

The Brady Center's End Family Fire campaign defines "Family Fire" as a shooting involving an improperly stored or misused gun in the home that results in death or injury. It calls on gun owners and non-gun owners to engage in conversations and to take actions to protect children from family fire.
